

## **Submission by the Plurinational State of Bolivia**

*on the Work programme on mitigation, ambition and implementation (MWP)  
for consideration at SBSTA*

Recalling Decision 4/CMA.4 and subsequent relevant decisions related to the work programme on mitigation, ambition and implementation, as well as the invitation to Parties and observers to submit their views on opportunities, best practices, actionable solutions, challenges and barriers relevant to the seventh global dialogue,

In this regard, the Plurinational State of Bolivia expresses its views on the aforementioned matters.

Bolivia emphasizes that the implementation of the Paris Agreement must be undertaken in full accordance with the principles and provisions of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, particularly equity and common but differentiated responsibilities and respective capabilities. Bolivia underlines that enhancing mitigation ambition must be linked to sustainable development and must not impose additional burdens on developing countries.

Bolivia further highlights that its climate action is framed within a renewed national vision aimed at advancing towards a “Green and Sustainable Bolivia ”, which promotes the integral management of natural resources, climate action and energy transition, strengthening territorial resilience and ensuring present and future well-being.

With regard to the focus of the seventh global dialogue, Bolivia considers that discussions should prioritize practical, scalable and solutions-oriented approaches to mitigation.

Bolivia highlights opportunities and best practices in land-use sectors, including forests, biodiversity and productive systems, such as sustainable forest management, ecosystem restoration and bioeconomy approaches.

Bolivia also emphasizes actionable solutions including the development of project pipelines, matchmaking spaces with investors, and strengthening institutional capacities.

Key barriers include limited access to finance, technology transfer constraints, and limited capacities.

Bolivia highlights opportunities for mobilizing finance through Article 6, including ITMOs, ensuring environmental integrity and alignment with national priorities.

Non-market approaches are recognized as complementary tools.

Bolivia emphasizes that the dialogue should be facilitative, oriented to solutions and focused on implementation.

In conclusion, Bolivia reiterates that success depends on enabling implementation, addressing barriers and supporting equitable approaches aligned with the vision of Green and Sustainable Bolivia.
